Police enforcement data dictionary

About the data

The department works with the following agencies from each state and territory to report on police enforcement:

- NSW Police Force and NSW Revenue
- Victoria Police
- Queensland Police Service and Department of Transport and Main Roads
- South Australia Police Force
- Western Australia Police Force
- Tasmania Police Force
- North Territory Police Force
- Australian Federal Police and Access Canberra

There are a number of limitations that exist in the data:

- Some police agencies only collect a part of police enforcement data. Some states collect both police
 and camera-issued fines, but some may have different government agencies collecting camera-issued
 fines. For example, Access Canberra collects data on seatbelt fines detected by camera instead of ACT
 Police.
- 2. Not all states and territories who own police enforcement data have their data publicly available. Some states share their police enforcement data publicly, while others do not, which makes it difficult to get a complete and accurate picture of national police enforcement. For example, NSW Police collects police-issued fines, but camera fines are publicly available and collected by NSW Revenue.

Since the collection of 2023 data, the data structure has changed to allow for more detailed information. The following data was new for 2023:

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- Monthly granularity, where available
- Age groups, where available
- Remoteness area, where available
- Details on detection method used, where available
- Details on drug type for positive drug tests
- Unlicensed driving
- Number of charges and arrests

Data is subject to revision.

Breath tests conducted	Number of random roadside breath tests conducted by testing a sample of a person's breath to determine whether or not a person's blood alcohol content is at least above a predetermined level.	Western Australia: In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the WA Police Force suspended Random Breath Testing policy on 17 March 2020. As a result, mass breath testing operations including the RTTA funded Operation Perception ceased, and 'business as usual' tests changed to a targeted model based on driver behaviour, observations and officer safety. The policy recommenced from 06 June 2020 at a reduced rate with additional protective measures in place for officers. This has contributed to a lower than usual number of random breath tests in 2020 and 2021.
Breath tests positive	Number of roadside breath tests where the driver's blood alcohol was above the legal limit for their licence type.	Australian Capital Territory: Fines data is not recorded by ACT Police. Charges data was used as proxy for count.
		New South Wales: Section 6 includes Law Part Codes in the COMPASS Offence Category 'PCA/DUI Offences'.
		Victoria: Fines, arrests and charges data cannot be provided since the database only provides detection data.
		Queensland: Fines data is not recorded. Charges data was used as a proxy for count.
		Missing data: 2020 to 2022 Tasmanian data is unavailable due to significant data quality issues.
		Not all states and territories could provide counts, fines, arrests and charges. To ensure a measure could be consistently used for reporting, a proxy for count was created using the sum of fines

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		and charges where count data was missing. This applied to New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia for 2023.
Drug tests conducted	Number of roadside drug tests conducted. It is an oral fluid sample indicating whether an illicit substance is present in a driver's oral fluid. The data are not necessarily restricted to random roadside tests.	Missing data: Data prior to 2021, 2023 and 2024 Northern Territory data are unavailable due to significant data quality issues.
Drug tests positive	Number of roadside drug test results where the oral fluid sample indicates an illicit substance is present in a driver's	Usage: To ensure accurate counts of positive drug tests, filter for BEST_DETECTION_METHOD = 'Yes'. It is not appropriate to sum Fines and Charges from all stages as a single incident can undergo 3 stages of drug testing.
	oral fluid.	The 3 stages of drug testing are: roadside (indicator or Stage 1), secondary confirmatory (Stage 2) and laboratory adjusted results (Stage 3). From 2023, positive drug test results from each stage was requested, but not all states and territories could provide data for all three stages.
		Victoria: Fines, arrests and charges data cannot be provided since the database only provides detection data. The Road Policing Drug and Alcohol Unit is only able to provide detection data to the 3 substances (MDMA (Ecstasy), Amphetamine (Meth) and Tetrahydrocannbinol (THC)) tested roadside. Drugs other than the 3 substances is detected through collision bloods, which is not included as part of the data provision.
		Missing data: To ensure a measure could be consistently used for reporting, a proxy for count was created from the sum of fines and charges where count data was missing. Since September 2024, secondary confirmatory tests for New South Wales have been discontinued.

		Queensland: Detections from cameras are assessed by an accredited Traffic Camera Office staff member to ensure that there is enough evidence to issue an infringement notice. Therefore, not all detections from road safety cameras result in

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		an infringement notice. Figures are reported from mobile speed cameras (overt, covert and portable), analogue fixed speed cameras, digital fixed speed cameras, digital combined speed/red light cameras.
		Tasmania: In 2012, civilian speed camera operators were not used. Additionally, aged equipment and software issues has impacted on the number of speed camera detections.
		Western Australia: Detection modes include On-The-Spot (OTS), mobile camera, fixed camera, average speed camera and redlight camera.
		Missing data: 2022 Australian Capital Territory data is not available. 2024 Victorian data volumes were low because of Protected Industrial Action (PIA).
Unlicensed driving	Number of fines issued for not having a valid license while driving. This is a new field collected for data reported from 2023.	Queensland: Fines reported for Queensland include both arrests and charges, as these cannot be separated.
		Missing data: 2024 Victorian data volumes were low because of Protected Industrial Action (PIA).

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
